Be Ready!

"But in your hearts honor Christ the Lord as holy, always being prepared to make a defense to anyone who asks you for a reason for the hope that is in you; yet do it with gentleness and respect." (1 Peter 3:15)

Back in the mid-late 20th century, the primary church planting strategy that was used by many Lutherans was that the district office would call a Pastor to serve as a "Missionary at Large", have that Pastor move to a community where district officials believed there was potential to start a new Lutheran church, rent a school gymnasium, an empty store front, or a hotel conference room, and put up a sign and take out an ad in the local newspaper saying that Lutheran worship services were being held at this place and at that time, and the expectation was, that people would just show up. Once the worshipping community then reached a critical mass, they would formally organize as a new congregation, call their own Pastor (sometimes being the Missionary at Large, sometimes calling someone else), and build a church building. For established churches, when it came to outreach, the expectation was that, when new people moved to the community that had a Lutheran background, they'd view your church sign as they drove by your building, or looked in the yellow pages of the phone book (remember those?), and then visit the church. The idea behind both strategies was that there was a cultural expectation, spoken or unspoken, that everyone in the community had a desire to have some sort of tie with a local church. And it was assumed that even people in our communities who had no ties to a church, at least had some basic knowledge about who Jesus is, and what the basics of Christianity are about.

Today, that is no longer the case. Gone are the days when we simply open our doors, and expect that visitors will somehow find us, show up on our doorstep, ready to be actively engaged in the life of our church. Studies tell us that when it comes to religious matters in our nation, the fastest growing segment are those who claim "no religious affiliation." Church involvement and attendance are no longer seen by our culture as an unspoken expectation as it once was. Many people have been deeply hurt by some sort of conflict that occurred in the life of the church, and instead of finding somewhere else to worship, have given up on the church and on Christianity entirely.

Today, the Mission Field doesn't begin in some far off, remote village in the bush on the other side of the world. The Mission Field begins as soon as we walk out of the doors of our church building!

With that in mind, knowing that we are called to fulfill the Great Commission to be disciples of Jesus, who make disciples of Jesus, the words of the verse from 1 Peter 3 I opened with become extremely important for all of us. As we actively engage the Mission Field that is our community, and we build relationships with those who are not here, we have to be ready to share the hope that is within us, to be able to explain why our faith in Jesus Christ, His gifts of forgiveness, peace, hope, and everlasting matter to us in a real, everyday way. We have to be ready to share why it's important for the Christian to be a part of and actively engaged in the work of a local congregation that is faithful to Jesus and His Word. How will this happen?

First, it begins by making a commitment to being a regular attender in our worship services. We mark that time each week as one of our top priorities, because the reality is, we need the support, encouragement, fellowship, and accountability that is offered by our being physically present in worship. But it goes beyond that. It also involves being immersed in Scripture, the life-giving Word of the Lord that warns us of our sin and the dangers of our world in which we live, and points us to the source of our hope, life, and salvation, which is Jesus Christ. The more we are actively engaged in study of God's Word, the more we are prepared to give a defense, or an explanation, of our Christ-Centered faith, and to share with those who do not know Jesus why they need Him!

A study was conducted that asked the question of people who joined a local church who or what prompted them to visit that particular church for the first time? 2% said that it was through an advertisement they saw somewhere. 6% said that it was from a personal invitation from the Pastor of that particular church. Another 6% said their point of entry into the church was through an organized evangelism program or emphasis the church was going through. The remaining 86% of people who responded said their point of entry into the church was through an invitation by a family member or a friend who was already a part of that congregation's life. You see, you are the most effective evangelists we have! As you build relationships with people who are not here, and as you share the hope you have in Jesus Christ, and what the Holy Spirit is up to in the life of our church, people will be drawn to that, and over time, will be ready to see Jesus with you here in this place.

I continue to pray that each and every one of you will continue to share the good things going on at Hope Lutheran Church, be ready to share about your faith in Jesus Christ each day, and that this emphasis on personal evangelism and relationship building will result in being an effective witness of the Gospel to our community and the world. January 2022

Endowment Committee Nomination: As per the Endowment Fund Plan of Operation, the Council is responsible for nominating members. This year there was one seat open and the Council voted to nominate Jackie Buchholz.

Maintenance Position: Council discussed the maintenance position. Council voted to convert the maintenance position back to an hourly position with a pay rate of \$20/hour for heating, plumbing and electrical duties. Gordie Dukerschein proposed revamping the maintenance job description and have the remaining duties covered by volunteers.
